## Aladinpur content with Gill's efforts

Aladinpur, the village adopted by Rajya Sabha MP Manohar Singh Gill under the Sansad Adarsh Gram Yojana, does not have a drinking water facility, fan or LPG cylinder at its aganwari centre for small children, who have no choice but to sit in a dingy room. Employees bring water from nearby homes and use dung cakes to cook for children. They have now been promised that they would get LPG cylinders soon as the village has been adopted by the Raiva Sabha MP

Overall, the village has more public utilities than any other village in its vicinity. It has two aganwari centres, It a veterinary clinic, a water works tank, a community biogas plant and a school.

However, the village does not have a proper sewerage system. Waste water goes in the village pond and water from the pond spills out many times. The district administration has assigned the duty of drawing out water from the pond to the Agriculture Department.

Most of the villagers, including panchayat members who belong to the SAD are all praise for Gill. "Manohar Singh has done a lot of things for this village. He has helped us start Senior Secondary School for Girls with smart classrooms. The school is going to start Class XII in medical stream from this session," said Nirmal Singh, village sarpanch.
